# **HEAP Updates Procedures for Upcoming Summer Crisis Program**

On June 1, 2016, the HEAP Department announced updates to their process for services. The updated procedures have been put into place prior to the upcoming Summer Crisis Program for the safety and convenience of CAA clients. The updated processes are:

- Customers with appointments will be seen from 8:00 am to 10:30 am, Monday through Thursday. Customers must call 1-866-747-1039.
- The first 40 walk-in customers will be accepted at 1:00 pm, Monday through Thursday. These customers are asked to arrive no earlier than 15 minutes before 1:00 pm.
- The first 20 senior citizen walk-in customers (ages 60+) will be seen at 9:00 am, Monday through Thursday.




The Summer Crisis Program will kick off on July 1, 2016. The program provides up to \$300 in utility assistance to qualified applicants and targets households with seniors (over age 60) or with individuals who have a medically diagnosed chronic illness or disease. Assistance can include supply of a new air conditioner or fan, monetary assistance, or a combination of both.

### **GCMI Launches Ice House Entrepreneurship Program**

GCMI was recently awarded a grant from the Greater Cincinnati Foundation (GCF) to provide entrepreneurship education through GCMI's new entrepreneurship curriculum called the Ice House Entrepreneurship Program. The Ice House Entrepreneurship Program (IHEP) brings "Eight Life Lessons from an Unlikely Entrepreneur" in an experiential problem-based learning format that will engage participants in the "entrepreneurial mindset." The IHEP is designed to equip participants with the perseverance and determination needed to become more successful. It engages and empowers them to take ownership of their future while developing knowledge skills and behaviors that will enable them to succeed and overcome poverty and/or the obstacles of poverty.

The GCF grant allows GCMI to focus on four (4) key target segments utilizing their Entrepreneurial Education and Mindset training: Workforce Development and Apprenticeship programs, Youth Development programs, Re Entry/Ex-offender programs, and GCMI traditional entrepreneurship programs. This partially online curriculum allows flexibility in its delivery method and can be used in various formats from workshops to a semester taught curriculum.

"We are excited to bring this curriculum to the Greater Cincinnati Region," stated GCMI Executive Director Willie Hill. "We feel the Ice House Entrepreneurship Program is a great program that will effect behavior changes and equip participants with entrepreneurship skills that will translate into them making better decisions that will positively affect their lives."

### **Summer Youth Employment Program**

In June, Youth Services kicked off the eight-week Summer Youth Employment Program which provides job readiness and life skills training to Cincinnati youth between the ages of 14–18. Youth will work between 20–30 hours a week from June to August, earning \$8.10 per hour (the current minimum wage for youth in Ohio). Employers include City departments, nonprofit organizations and private sector partners. Youth are placed in career-oriented employment opportunities such as law enforcement, fire and safety, horticulture, recreation, art, technology and administration.
